The environment is in need of our help, we have through selfish, greedy, destruction destroyed our home it is time to make things right.

I am very concerned about the ongoing plight of asylum seekers in detention and in the community on temporary visas. Inhumane government policies for many years now have been supported by dehumanising and discriminatory media coverage, which in turn has strongly influenced negative social attitudes and indifference to this issue.
